

What is a Naturalistic Argument?

What is a naturalistic argument? The question of naturalism divides the whole spectrum of contemporary philosophy, from the philosophy of language, mind and action, to moral and political philosophy. The aim of this workshop is to explore naturalism, in different fields of philosophy, from the point of view of the type of arguments used to defend a naturalistic position: is there a type of argument that can be described as (intrinsically) naturalistic? If so, as opposed to which other types? What kinds of historical differences can be drawn among different types of naturalistic arguments? Do these arguments differ according to the fields/problems of philosophy in/for which they are defended, and in what ways?

The present workshop will explore these issues in the following fields: the philosophy of mind and the philosophy of language, the history of analytical philosophy, the philosophy of gender, the philosophy of social sciences.
